Changing of the Guard ♥

As of July 1, Julia Greeley's remains will have a new guardian and the Guild a new pastor. Fr. Samuel Morehead, currently pastor of All Souls parish, eight miles down Logan St., will replace Fr. Ron Cattany, who

will move 30 some miles north to Mead CO, where he will be pastor of Guardian Angels parish.

Fr. Morehead will be the Guild's sixth pastor. We started in 2011 under Fr. Gene Emrisek, O.F.M.Cap., and continued under Fr. Alvaro Pancueva, both at Sacred Heart; then moved to Curé d'Ars parish under Fr. Simon Kalonga and Fr. Faustinus Anyamele; and moved to the Cathedral under Fr. Cattany when Julia's body was transferred there in 2017.



A native of Colorado, Fr. Morehead was ordained a priest for the Archdiocese of Denver in 2012. Having first studied broadcasting journalism and English at the University of Colorado at Boulder, he

studied for the priesthood at St. John Vianney Theological Seminary. At All Souls since 2015, he has also served as a regular guest lecturer on the Sacred Liturgy and the spiritual life for the Spirituality Year of the seminary, in addition to being a visiting professor for the Midwest Theological Forum's Rome Experience summer formation program. With a penchant for history and culture, he is particularly passionate about his family's English homeland. His greatest loves are Jesus Christ, the Blessed Virgin, and the Catholic Church.

Fr. Cattany invited us to ministry at the Cathedral Basilica, provided us a headquarters office near his

own office, very regularly attended the Guild's

meetings, and contributed much to their success. The Guild especially appreciates his procuring the beautiful red heart wood funerary box and the Carrara marble sarcophagus for Julia's remains and for the devotion to her that he has personally fostered in the Cathedral parish.

Two Annual Masses ♥

Early this year, Fr. Joseph LaJoie, now in his second year as pastor of Sacred Heart Parish, told the Guild he was anxious to promote the Servant of God Julia Greeley's home parish as a point of veneration and intercession (*see his letter to the right*)

This was extremely welcome news to the Guild, since the transfer of Julia's body to the Cathedral Basilica in 2017 unwittingly took our attention away from the previous good relationship we have had with the Julia's former stomping grounds.

Long before there was a Guild, Father Medrano, pastor of Sacred Heart and son of the parish, marked several anniversaries of Julia's death with open-air Masses near her grave at Mt. Olivet.

In 2013, the Guild began the annual practice of having such Masses at Sacred Heart Church on or near June 7, the anniversary of Julia's "passing the pearly gates."

When Julia's body was transferred to the Cathedral in 2017, the annual Masses moved there also, where we have been able to have a much larger gatherings of Julia friends.

There's no reason, however, why we can't also have an annual Mass at Sacred Heart Church on a smaller, more intimate scale.

Julia herself didn't know when she was born into slavery so she probably never celebrated her birthday. We do know when she was reborn into the freedom of Christ's kingdom, and it is another great anniversary to celebrate.

So this year on Saturday, June 26, the Guild will celebrate the 141st

anniversary of Julia's baptism, with a 7 pm Mass, and we hope many of our Members and Friends are able to join us. Put it in your calendar while you're still thinking about it.

Why do Catholics venerate so many Saints and celebrate feasts in their honor? It is because we need examples and inspirations in our Christian journey.


It can be hard for Black Catholics to find holy individuals that they can identify with and look to for insights and visions. American Black Catholics now have a book which can help to meet this need.

Another Possible Book ♥

Alexia Williams, post-doctoral associate at the Danforth Center on Religion and Politics at Washington University in St. Louis, talked about the six African-American candidates for sainthood at the Drexel Dialogues, organized by the Catholic Student Center on Nov. 17.

Alexia did her doctoral dissertation at Yale on African-American candidates for sainthood, but she studied only some of the Saintly Six. She hopes to one day add Julia and other missing ones and publish it. Later this year she begins teaching at the University of Illinois at Urbana.

Guild Helpers in Heaven ♥

This past December, when we had been waiting for 28 months for anything to happen in Rome in Julia's Cause, it occurred to me I should stop asking Julia to help move things along, since she would not likely want to be promoting herself.

So I started asking her five fellow black American servants of God to work on her behalf. I did so frequently for a little over a month, and was happily surprised to see my prayers answered.

I hope the five will help keep things moving, but I have also thought of another saintly solicitor to enlist, St. Katharine Drexel.

We know for a fact that Katharine had some interest in Julia already while on earth, as **she had in her possession a typed transcript of Julia's lengthy** *Denver Catholic Register* **obituary.**

It occurs to me now (caution: we are now moving into a series of unproveable suppositions), but Katharine may very well have met Julia on the occasion of her visit to Denver in 1911, seven years before Julia's death. She visited the Jesuits at Sacred Heart College (now Regis University) on Oct. 18 and they recorded the visit on p. 108 of their House Diary.

At the time, Julia was employed as a cook working just across Lowell Blvd. from Sacred Heart College. Jennie and Maggie Ryan were close friends of the Jesuits, and it's quite possible (but undocumented) that Jennie and Maggie were invited by their Jesuit friends to meet Mother Drexel.

Katharine was well known as spending much of her life funding and otherwise

supporting the evangelization of African and Native Americans, which might have led the Ryans to take Julia with them to meet Katharine. Maybe someday further research will support some of these suppositions.

Meanwhile, St. Katharine, please help the Guild in its mission to make Julia better known.

Study of the Friends' List ♥

Late last year, *Wagon*'s mailing list topped 1,000, which presented a good opportunity to study the breadth of its reach.

The majority of those on the list are located in Colorado, but Julia's fame has gone far beyond the Centennial State's borders. There are subscribers now from at least 38 states, the District of Columbia, and 13 foreign countries.

Thus far we have not identified any of those on the list as being from Delaware, Maine, New Hampshire, Nevada, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, West Virginia, Wyoming, Utah; but there may well be some, since there are many on the list for whom we have only email addresses.

The foreign countries with *Wagon* readers are Colombia, Costa Rica, Mexico, Ireland, the United Kingdom, Poland, Italy, Malta, Ghana, Uganda, Borneo, Papua New Guinea, and the Philippines.

Mea Maxima Culpa ♥

Not deliberately nor consciously, but rather through negligence, I editorially added 13 years to Julia's enslavement. It added no new pain for her, but it certainly was an embarrassing blow to my persistent efforts to get Julia's story right.

When I submitted the text for *An Hour with Julia Greeley*, I wrote, "Freed near the end of the Civil War, Julia labored for about nine years as a cook and nanny for the children of Dr. Paul G. Robinson and his wife Lina..."

When the galley proofs came back, they said, "Before being freed near the end of the Civil War, Julia labored for about nine years as a cook and nanny for Dr. Paul G. Robinson and his wife, Lina..."

I missed the switch altogether when proofreading, and noticed it only about a year after the pamphlet was published.

Since then I heard this newest mistake about Julia on a radio program about her and read it in a book, which said, "Greeley spent nearly a decade in St. Louis as housekeeper for a prominent white family before she gained her freedom after the Emancipation Proclamation."

Let me put it another way: Julia Greeley was freed from slavery in 1865 and worked for the Robinsons from about 1869 till 1878.


