Big, Big News ♥

This will be a small story releasing enormous news. We've been waiting for two years, four months, and 18 days to hear that things are



moving in Rome. Vice-Postulator
Dave Uebbing has received word
from Postulator Waldery Hilgeman
that the Congregation for the
Causes of Saints has issued a
decree approving the validity of the
investigation here in Denver of
Julia's life and cult. The next step

is to appoint a person to construct the official *Positio* based on the Denver findings delivered to Rome on Sept. 14, 2018.

Cardinal Gregory: Eucharist & Works of Mercy ♥

In "A Eucharistic Vision for Today's World," Cardinal Wilton Gregory's keynote address for the Eucharistic Congress called to mark the current bicentennial of the Diocese of Richmond, His Eminence spoke of how Eucharistic adoration requires

action.



We reprint part of his Nov. 7 address here, since it offers insights which can profitably be

traced through the life story of our Servant of God Julia, whose Eucharistic devotion was so remarkable.

"True eucharistic devotion is not a substitute for social justice, Christian involvement with the world, or Gospelbased charity," he said. "In a similar vein, those who promote and encourage a deeper eucharistic devotional life must be aware that the favored result of a eucharistic spirituality is a greater commitment to the charity and justice called for in the Gospel by Christ himself."

Those who participate in eucharistic devotion, the cardinal-designate said, have an "obligation to take upon yourself the very mission of Christ."

"One cannot pray before the Blessed Sacrament — the Bread of Life — and not eventually also recall that all those who dine on the Lord's generosity have a responsibility in justice and in charity to respond to the needs of those who hunger for ordinary bread each day," he said. Gregory explained what should result from eucharistic devotion.

"The true evidence of a proper eucharistic devotional life is a deeper commitment to the needs of the poor, the forgotten, the ones whom Christ identified as the least of his sisters and brothers," he said.

"True eucharistic devotion must connect us with the still unfinished work of eradicating racism in our society — a topic that has come to the fore in recent months perhaps as never before," the prelate added.


Ohio Justice Committee

A Precious Pearl Found V

While web surfing yesterday I stumbled onto and read Frederick Douglas' Sept. 3, 1848, open letter to Mr. Thomas Auld, his former enslaver. It's a masterfully crafted



document
Douglas
published in
his
newspaper,
the *North Star*, to share
with white
folks the
horrors of
slavery.

I urge all of Julia's friends,

white and black alike, to read every word of this letter, imagining, if you might, that it's written by a long-lost brother of Julia. It'll give you many new insights into Julia's background and possible way of thinking that my writings have no way of accomplishing, since not a single one of my sources was ever in slavery.

Auld actually read Douglass's letter and informed him that he had not turned out his grandmother Betsey Bailey to die homeless. Douglass publicly apologized profoundly to Auer on two different occasions for falsely accusing him.

I have several related documents written by some of my Catholic ancestors in 18th and 19th century Maryland. They begin by piously professing their belief in God and trust in his merciful forgiveness and then pass on to their spouses and children their land, horses and slaves.

These last will and testaments have always left me sad, but only since I have read Frederick's letter have I fully felt their hypocracy. I still thank God for the genes and faith these men handed on to my generation of the family, but I also ask God's pardon and that of the black community for the terrible lies my forefathers bought into and acted on.

Book About Saintly Six ♥

Black Catholics on the Road to Sainthood is a 96-page paperback scheduled to be

Sad to say, although the book hasn't been released yet, Nate Tinner-Williams, editor of The *Black Catholic Messenger*, has already posted a critique of it unseen, titled "New Black Saints Book May Fall Flat," mainly because some of those reflecting have not shared his own vision of black thought.

What Can I Do? ♥

I am a member of the Julia Greeley Guild; and as such, I have asked to share a little of my heart regarding the canonization process for Julia's cause. I wish it would move along faster!! I'm sure this is a feeling we all have.

Fr. Blaine writes in his book, *In Secret service of the Sacred Heart, The Life and Virtues of Julia Greeley*, Julia "will always remain a stellar role model for all those who have been placed in challenging situations in life, as well as those who have been blessed with everything."

It is in those words that I experience a sense of urgency caused by the danger facing black and brown people these days. Four hundred years of racial injustice, a global health crisis disproportionately effecting people of color, mass unemployment, mass incarceration, inequity in education and more cry out for mercy and Julia's example of loving kindness.

Certainly these are those "challenging situations" our brothers and sisters face daily.

Julia's love for the Sacred Heart of Jesus, her life of prayer, and her acts of loving service are models for how we can proceed in these overwhelming times of need. I think of the mothers on the South Side of Chicago who claim street corners in their neighborhoods as their "watch places" marked by lawn chairs and picnic tables covered with trays of cookies and pitchers of lemonade. They quietly sit there, keeping surveillance over their streets so that killings have been reduced in those communities.

I think of community organizations whose members give of their time to meet, to identify who has the power to control the delivery of city services to the community, as well as, who has the power to make constructive meaningful change in our penal system -and on and on - to address the unequal treatment of people of color. All of

this to encourage structural change so that our communities serve everyone equally.

This is the 21st century work of Julia Greeley - quiet prayer and loving acts of mercy, almost so that no one really notices who is doing this work. But the work gets done.



The story of Julia's life raises for us the question, what can I do in my corner of the world to make life a little better for someone else? Her story will be told around the world, once she is recognized by the Church as a canonized saint thereby, giving us an example and courage to do what it means to be the hands of Jesus in our own time.

So, we need this canonization soon. The time is now. Let's hope the process moves along, faster!!

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
